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About Stone Barns

Stone Barns Center for Food and Agriculture mission is to create a healthy and sustainable food system that benefits us all. On 80 acres in Westchester County, just 25 miles north of New York City, they operate a highly diversified, four-season farm and an education center that hosts over a hundred thousand visitors each year. As a nonprofit, they work to: experiment with and improve sustainable farming practices; train beginning farmers in resilient, regenerative farming techniques; help children discover the sources of their food while preparing them to steward the land that provides it; increase public awareness of healthy, seasonal and sustainable food.

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About Hilltop Hanover

Hilltop Hanover Farm & Environmental Center is a working crop farm and environmental education center, with roots dating back to the 1600's. Today they act as a regional education hub offering programs on healthy and sustainable food production, skills for small-scale suburban and urban farmers, and sustainable living practices for local communities. The farm features demonstration models for backyard farming, animal management, rainwater harvesting, organic composting, and green-roof technology. Visitors are welcome to hike the farm's 3.5 miles of woodland trails, enjoy a picnic overlooking the property, and visit our chickens and goats. Hilltop Hannover holds numerous classes and lectures, offers seasonal CSA shares, and maintains a farm stand and U-Pick program during the growing season. They also offer guided tours, classes, and field trips for school groups, garden clubs, and scout troops.

About Green Chimneys Farm & Wildlife Center Sam and Myra Ross Institute

The mission of Green Chimneys is to help young people with diverse needs to maximize their potential by providing residential, educational, clinical and recreational services, in a safe and supportive environment that nurtures connections with their families, the community, animals and nature. At Green Chimneys Children's Garden (1-acre) and Boni-Bel Organic Garden (5-acres), students are involved in seeding, weeding, harvesting of the produce as well as in the preparation of the garden for the following year. The children are also fully involved in maple syrup and honey production. Both gardens have full-time staff that oversee the gardens and ensure that the students are involved in the academic, gardening and vocational opportunities we have available to them. We offer garden classes in the regularly scheduled school day. These classes are taught by NYS certified teachers and support NY State Learning Standards. In addition students learn how to take care of 300 animals of many species in a non-production model, learning about the needs of farm animals, wildlife and horses.

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About Common Ground Farm

Common Ground Farm is a non-profit farm project that serves their community as a model for food justice and education for people of all ages and incomes. Common Ground Farm is deeply rooted in the Beacon community. Common Ground's farmers make weekly donations to several local food pantries and soup kitchens. They partner with Cornell Cooperative Extension to run the Growing Greens Program with the Green Teens. This program enables teenagers to learn life skills, manage a low cost mobile market, and support Common Ground's farmers with their work while earning an income. Common Ground Farm partners with the Beacon City School District and Hudson Valley Seed to run a successful and popular farm to school program. The program features a monthly vegetable, regular garden visits, chef visits to the classroom and field trips to the farm. Their educational programming also includes a toddler and parent series, regular adult workshops, and a popular summer camp.

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About Manhattan Country School

Manhattan Country School is a New York City school, founded in 1966, to be a place where where equality, social justice, a diverse community and the inspiration of Martin Luther King, Jr. would form the basis for children's education. One of the most significant parts of the school's academic experience takes place at our award-winning farm in the Catskill Mountains in upstate New York. The Manhattan Country School Farm is a place where children celebrate childhood while in a constant state of learning. At the Farm, students learn invaluable lessons about community and interdependence, nature and the sustainable production of food, energy and fiber. They delve deeply into the soil to produce the food they and other students will eat during the school year and take full ownership of the life of the farm and the community. Throughout their years at Manhattan Country School, students spend a total of 17 weeks in residence at the farm, beginning in the 7-8s' year and continuing throughout many seasons until they graduate at the end of 8th grade. Many alumni credit their time at the MCS Farm as the most important and eye-opening experience of their young lives.

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About Manhattan Country School

Since 1972, Hawthorne Valley Farm has been producing high quality, Biodynamic and organic foods while providing farm-based learning experiences for children and adults. Their 400-acre Biodynamic farm includes dairy cows, vegetables, a creamery, organic bakery, sauerkraut cellar, and more. Their Farm Store is a full-line natural foods store open 7 days a week.

Hawthorne Valley's work revolves around cultivating relationships: with the earth, our surrounding communities and landscape, and with one another. The times are calling for a new form of agriculture – Agriculture 3.0 – that requires a radically enlarged context of sound farming principles, new economic forms and parameters, and renewed recognition of the role of agriculture and agriculturists in our culture and society.

Visitors have the opportunity to participate in morning barn chores as our students do--feeding the chickens, collecting eggs, cleaning out cow stalls and milking a cow. This will be followed by a warm breakfast in our kitchen which doubles as our cooking classroom.

Farm faculty will give visitors a tour of the Farm and describe the program and the multiple ways that children work, learn and play in different areas of the site. This will be coupled with a sample activity from one of our farm classes: Cooking, Farming, Nature or Textiles. Throughout each experience we'll emphasize how the Farm experience is one founded in socio-emotional development and the complexities of living in a dynamic community.
